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


Indian Farmer 's Protest Field Research (2020-2021)

Enough Schooling? Migration to Canada & Educational Aspirations of the Youth in Punjab


Dr. Christine Moliner (O.P. Jindal University) and Prabhjot Kaur (MA, O.P Jindal University) presented on the impacts of Punjabi migration to Canada for postsecondary schooling. Their talk questioned dominant narratives around migration as well as the social and human costs of transnational mobility especially on young girls and their families left behind.



Where Are The Women: Love, Solace, and Courage

'Where Are The Women: Love, Solace, and Courage' re-imagines archival images and their connected stories through an inclusion of women's voices and lived experiences, providing the foundation for HERSTORY, while the narrative in the portraits continues timelessly into the next generations. The research, based on the interview of four South Asian women from the Fraser Valley who were separated from their partners for a number of years before reuniting with them in Canada, sought to interrupt that flow of time to re-inscribe the untold story into the images so that the story is complete. This research includes researching the archival images, and reimagining old family portraits- complete with the story as we learn it.

The support for this project was based on a Centennial Legacy Fund grant received from the BC Historical Federation.



"Rails, Jails & Trolleys" A Documentary on the Indian Farmers' Protest

Rails, Jails and Trolleys documents history's largest farmers' protest and the Canadian diaspora's response to it. This ground-breaking documentary captures the electric ethos of a protest that received international attention and the resounding response by Canadians to the movement. A full year in the making the film tells the story of why and how the farmers' movement ignited a nation, and youth, women, and men from all over the world. Directed by young filmmaker Ms. Henna Mann and produced by the South Asian Studies Institute at the University of the Fraser Valley.



2023 Sikh Heritage Museum Exhibition Marriages & Migration: A Transnational Story of BC

On July 25th, 2023, the South Asian Studies Institute launched a new exhibition at the Sikh Heritage Museum located in the National Historic Site Gur Sikh Temple, Abbotsford, BC. The exhibition, titled Marriages & Migration: A Transnational Story of BC, uses evocative photos from the Del Monte collection hosted on SACDA to tell the history of transnational marriages in Abbotsford's Punjabi Sikh community.

Del Monte Studio operated in Abbotsford from 1947 to the 1990s. Many Punjabi families had their important moments and milestones captured at this studio. The photographs selected for this exhibition present a glimpse into Panjabi Sikh wedding arrangements and ceremonies from the 1960s to the 1990s and how these unions were a way to facilitate immigration to Canada and reunite families.





The opening was attended by some of the very couples featured in the exhibition! It was a beautiful way for those community members to reflect on their memories and experiences in the Gur Sikh Temple.

However, many of the couples and families in the Del Monte collection remain unidentified. One of the goals of this exhibition is to hopefully reach families and friends of those pictured, so that we may include their names.

Marriages & Migration: A Transnational Story of BC will be open until July 2024. The Sikh Heritage Museum, located at 33089 South Fraser Way, Abbotsford, BC, is open 7 days a week from 9am-5pm.

Komagata Maru commemorative signage and street renaming unveiling

The City of Abbotsford worked with the Khalsa Diwan Society and the South Asian Studies Institute (UFV) to honour the memory and efforts of the Komagata Maru passengers to challenge injustice as well as celebrate the Abbotsford South Asian community's efforts to aid their countrymen.



The opening was attended by Mayor and Council, families featured in the exhibition, and many community members who came and listened to people talk about how historic of a moment it was to have the Komagata Maru passengers honoured in such a significant way:

"I was so privileged to attend yesterday's historical gathering. What a gift of cultural and historical sharing took place with such good people so involved in the events being acknowledged...This is a part of our Canadian story that our citizens need to be aware of. We cannot let such incidents happen again, but they could happen if we do not know the story," Art Turnbull, Pastor and Interfaith collaborator.

Komagata Maru

The City of Abbotsford partnered with the Khalsa Diwan Society and the South Asian Studies Institute to commemorate the Komagata Maru tragedy in two ways: by commissioning 3 commemorative plaques at the Sikh Heritage Museum and by renaming a portion of South Fraser Way to Komagata Maru




The event at UFV created space for commemoration, dialogue, future plans, and outcomes towards the elimination of caste discrimination while developing anti-casteist societies in BC.

Becoming Human: Using Literature to Legitimize Identity



In a panel discussion moderated by Dr. Satwinder Bains and Dhahan Prize founder Barj Dhahan, Deepti Babuta, Balijit, and Jameel Ahmad Paul discussed how literature and education empower women and give voice to oppressed groups. The Dhahan Prize for Punjabi Literature celebrates the rich culture and transnational heritage of Punjabi literature and language in the two Punjabi scripts, Gurmukhi and Shahmukhi.

Unarchived screening

The South Asian Canadian Digital Archive (SACDA) at the South Asian Studies Institute (SASI) hosted students and faculty from the the Department of Information Studies at UFV on November 7, 2023. The SACDA team was excited to host the students, Assistant Professor Karen Sharkey, and the Department Coordinator, Michelle Elliott, at the SASI offices in the K Building.

It is a quiet January morning in Paldi, a small lumber mill town on Vancouver Island in BC. Amidst ruins of the mill town, coniferous trees, and wild grasses, a small gravel road leads to a two-storey wooden building, the Paldi Gurdwara. It was built in 1919 and is one of the oldest gurdwaras in Canada.

In a room at the far back of the building on the ground floor, the walls of the office are filled with framed photographs, postcards, hand-drawn maps, and newspaper clippings. It is a room where history is very much alive—as a witness to time and people, lives shared, and those who thrived here. The rusty nails scattered around the walls, ripped pieces of duct tape pasted on the corners of the frames, the fading handwritten names in Punjabi and Urdu on the back of the postcards, the uneven cuttings of newspapers—all tell a story. The story of Paldi. The story of early South Asians on the Pacific coast of Canada.

Almost a century after the Paldi Gurdwara was built, the South Asian Canadian Digital Archive (SACDA) was formed in 2020 to document the 120+ years of history and heritage of the South Asian diaspora in Canada. Over the past three years, the SACDA team has worked on developing 60 unique multilingual archival collections. These collections speak to the histories, cultures, and key contributions of South Asian communities in Canada that range from immigration and social histories, arts and culture, and labour activism to built environment histories.

As we reflect on our work at this juncture and the kind of archival praxis for which we strive and envision building to foster knowledge equity and diversity, we keep coming back to the questions of what we archive and how we archive.

During our visit to the Paldi Gurdwara last year, Mayo Singh's grandson Robin told us stories of the people of Paldi while carefully removing frames from the walls, pausing at photos and examining faces. We sat on the floor in front of a flatbed scanner digitizing the photographs. The granthi's four-year-old daughter circled around the scanner, curious about the entire process, and telling us the story of Mayo Singh in an animated voice. The granthi brought us sliced bananas and apples sprinkled with black pepper and insisted we eat them before continuing with work. In that room, our approach was manifest: a community archive and archival praxis and process that centers people, in their homes, in their places of worship, on the floors, sharing food, memories, and histories. Like Paldi, SACDA is also a place for everyone.

We place the community in the center, as opposed to having records in the center. We employ tools and processes that are open and collaborative with open source software. We build multilingual knowledge infrastructures and a dynamic descriptive framework with locally-maintained thesaurus and authorities. We strive to build knowledge infrastructures that reflect the plurality of our diverse knowledge systems.

We build multilingual collections, and we take an innovative and collaborative approach to metadata creation. We facilitate spaces where the community is present and engaged throughout the archival processing—from knowledge creation to sharing. At SACDA, community members actively contribute to the naming of the collection and files, metadata creation, classification, and writing family histories. The community is not outside of history but very much within and co-collaborating in writing it and building it—in our own voices, the way we want to be described and documented, in our own words.

The nominations procedure is overseen by an international nominations committee. In 2022, 26 projects from all across the world were nominated under the Best DH Dataset category, and it was an honor to share our work with a global audience.

The City unveiled permanent exhibits at the Gur Sikh Temple on July 22 and announced the double naming of a portion of South Fraser Way as Komagata Maru Way to commemorate the spirit of activism in 1914.

The Inclusive Communities for Older Immigrants (ICOI) partnership is a 7-year multidisciplinary, multi-sector, multi-province project that aims to build sustainable connections to generate knowledge about social isolation and connectedness among older immigrants, support multidirectional knowledge exchange, and improve older immigrants' lives. The (ICOI) partnership brings together 48 academic and 38 community partners in 9 cities in British Columbia, Alberta, Ontario, and Quebec.


2023 Shortlist for the Governor General's History Award for Excellence in Community Programming

Rails, Jails, and Trolleys, a groundbreaking documentary directed by local filmmaker Henna Mann and produced by the South Asian Studies Institute, was featured and recognized by many national and international film festivals. The film presents the history and present-day events on the decline of agriculture in India. The film analyzes responses to three agricultural bills passed by the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) under Prime Minister Narendra Modi in September 2020. The response to these bills became the 'largest farmer's protest in human history.'


