

In The Classroom



BUS 322 - Advanced Selling

This semester our **BUS 322** - **Advanced Selling** classes supported the agricultural community in British Columbia by partnering with the **BC Agriculture Council (BCAC)**. The BCAC is the lead industry advocate in the province for associations and counsels involved in agriculture representing 28 members responsible for 96% of the province's farm gate sales. Our students ran a renewal campaign during the month of November in which teams of students sold BCAC Farmer ID cards to qualified farmers. In total, students closed \$8,085 worth of sales, which was a major accomplishment. This successful sales campaign with the BCAC is a testament to the hard work of our excellent UFV students, as well as to the quality of the education that UFV is providing students through our **Bachelor of Business degree** and **Professional Sales minor**.



Collaborative Online International Learning

Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) refers to a type of educational approach that connects students and educators from different countries and cultures through online platforms. The purpose of COIL is to promote global learning, intercultural exchange, and the development of crosscultural competencies by facilitating interactions between students from different educational institutions around the world. The key feature of COIL is collaboration, where students from different countries complete joint assignments and learning experiences. The UFV School of Business currently has five faculty members participating in the COIL program, two of which began their program this fall.

Mark Breedveld had a highly successful experience with COIL when paired with a professor and her class at **Al Akhawayn University (AUI)** in **Ifrane, Morocco**. Teams of three UFV students taking BUS 221 -Professional Selling were paired with teams of three AUI students taking a business course in analytics. Together they investigated and reported on the ethics and legality of a small business taking cash payments without reporting it for income tax purposes. The project fostered significant cultural exchange, allowing students from both institutions to connect and collaborate in meaningful ways.

As a gesture of appreciation and to further immerse the students in Moroccan culture, Mark hosted a special event at the end of the project, treating the class to an **authentic Moroccan dinner** catered by an Abbotsford resident of Moroccan descent. The menu included traditional dishes such as chickpea soup, Moroccan crepes with honey, seafood cakes wrapped in pastry, dates with almonds, and jasmine tea. To enhance the experience, Mark invited the chef as well as a Moroccan exchange student from AUI currently attending UFV to the event. They shared valuable insights into Moroccan culture, providing the students with a unique, first-hand perspective on life in Morocco. The experience not only enriched the students' understanding of Moroccan traditions but also deepened the intercultural connections fostered through the COIL project.



"The students and I learned a lot about the challenges of working on collaborative international projects. Time zone differences, cultural differences, and dual stakeholder requirements were all part of our learning. This cross-cultural project demonstrated innovative learning and real-world application.

BUS 408 - Teamwork in Organizations

Dr. Jelena Brcic's BUS 408 class always includes a community outreach project. Every semester, students impress with their innovative and impactful projects, and this fall was no exception.

There was the **"Morning Motion Dance Class"**, which offered a free dance class to UFV students. The purpose of the class was to engage in exercise, which improves mental health, as well as to connect with friends and have fun doing it. The event also incorporated a charitable element, which involved asking participants for a non-perishable food item.

Next, there was **"Pedal Towards Wellness"**, which offered students a free spin class. The class was achieved through partnership with Mamba Cycle, a local fitness club that models its ethos after the Mamba Mentality of Kobe Bryant. This mentality champions relentless work and growth, with the idea of cultivating not only physical fitness but also mental strength and determination.

Finally, there was the **"Paws for Wellness"** therapy dog event, where students interacted with therapy dogs, learned about UFV's mental health resources, and spoke with St. John Ambulance volunteers. The event helped more than 50 people, including students studying for finals, to feel calmer and more centred.

"Sewa for the Community: A Zero Hunger Initiative" was a community-driven initiative to prepare and distribute fresh meals. The driving force behind the initiative was the Sikh traditions of Sewa (selfless service) and Langar (community kitchen). By partnering with the local Sikh Gurudwara and the Salvation Army, a Christian charitable organization, this team was able to deliver 50 boxes of food to people in need.

There was **"Closet Cleanout for a Cause"**, where students solicited donations of clothing items from UFV students, staff, and faculty, which were then donated to the MCC Thrift Shop in Abbotsford. The event successfully engaged the UFV community in the sustainable fashion practice of reducing textile waste, while supporting a local charity.

Community Engagement

In addition, the launch of our new Mentorship Program connects students with experienced professionals, offering valuable guidance for personal and professional growth. These efforts not only reflect our strategic priorities but also reinforce our commitment to making a meaningful impact both on and off campus.

Economic Development Table

The UFV School of Business continues to support economic development in the City of Abbotsford through its participation with the **Economic** Development Table. The Table is a network of organizations in Abbotsford who have a role, mandate, and interest in local economic development. It is an initiative of the City of Abbotsford that builds on collaborative work already taking place, increasing information dissemination and identify areas where we can work together. The Table includes representatives from the Abbotsford Chamber of Commerce; Abbotsford Downtown **Business Association; Community Futures South** Fraser; Community Futures Stó:lo; Fraser Valley Indo-Canadian Business Association; Leg'á:mel First Nation; Mathxwi First Nation; Rotary Club of Abbotsford-Sumas; Semá:th First Nation; and Tourism Abbotsford. Most recently, the School met with the Table on November 27th. One topic that was raised was the need for workshops or microcredentials in various business-related topics for local entrepreneurs. The Economic Development Table meets next after the holidays in January.

External Program Advisory Committee

On September 24th, 2024, the **External Program Advisory Committee** gathered for yet another productive meeting. The meeting brought together external advisors, faculty, and student leaders. School of Business faculty and staff provided a comprehensive update on the activities of the school of business. There were meaningful discussions on the state of the aviation, banking, and education industries. While students from the HR Student Association, the Student Accounting Association, and UFV Enactus attended and provided updates to the group on their current activities. Enactus

Enactus UFV provides a platform for students to work on projects that address community challenges, using innovative, sustainable solutions to make a tangible difference. This fall, we continue to expand our Enactus initiatives with exciting new projects, including the Biochar Project, which focuses on sustainability by converting waste materials into a valuable resource for soil health, and the Junior Dragons project, where students help young entrepreneurs pitch their business ideas. These initiatives not only enrich the educational experience but also reflect our dedication to developing leaders who can effect real-world change.

Biochar Project

The **Fraser Valley AgroConnect Biochar project** is a recent collaboration between Enactus UFV and the UFV Trades and Technology Centre. This partnership emerged from a series of discussions involving Christopher Monkman, the Director of the School of Trades, professors Jason Campbell and Saeed Rahman from the School of Business, as well as Sargun Gill, President of Enactus UFV. Biochar is a carbon-rich product made through pyrolysis of organic waste materials, known primarily for its use in agriculture. When made carefully, biochar yields Binto Chan, a high-quality biochar with consistent porosity and surface area that can be used in cooking, as well as several useful byproducts.

The project aims to identify a viable market for biochar and its byproducts, targeting high-end Asian restaurants and local BBQ stores. Through market analysis, branding, and supply chain development, the team seeks to position Binto Chan as a sustainable, eco-friendly product. Over the next six months, the Enactus UFV team will finalize a business plan, conduct comprehensive research, generate stakeholder interest, and prepare for Enactus Regional and National competitions. Collaboration across UFV's trades, agriculture, and business faculties will foster interdisciplinary learning, bridging academia with practical trades. The project will offer UFV students valuable hands-on experience in market analysis and stakeholder collaboration. By transforming waste into a sustainable, eco-friendly product, the project will support local businesses and environmental conservation.

Junior Dragons

Enactus UFV is excited to launch the **Junior Dragons Competition**, a dynamic initiative aimed at engaging and inspiring local high school students to embrace the entrepreneurial spirit. Through mentorship and guidance, participants will develop and present business ideas while competing for \$1,500 in prize money to kickstart their entrepreneurial ventures. Furthermore, each year, Enactus UFV will mentor one winning team, introducing them to both UFV's resources and the Enactus Canada network.

This initiative bridges the gap between high school students and UFV, positioning the university as a leader in community development and education, and creating a pipeline for future enrolment. By 2027, we aim to engage over 300 high school students through annual competitions and bootcamps alone. To maintain long-term impact, we will build relationships with local businesses and entrepreneurs, encouraging them to participate as mentors, judges, and guest speakers, which will increase the event's visibility and credibility. In these ways, the Junior Dragons Competition will provide value to not only the School of Business but UFV as a whole and the entire community of the Fraser Valley.



Work Integrated Learning

As part of our ongoing efforts to enhance work-integrated learning opportunities for our students, the School, in collaboration with the Centre for Experiential and Career Education (CECE), has been actively exploring partnerships with leading companies.

Enterprise Mobility

One such partnership explored was with **Enterprise Mobility**. On October 17th, we had the pleasure of hosting **Charan Bamrah**, Talent Acquisition Specialist at Enterprise Mobility, in a virtual meeting to discuss potential opportunities for our students. Enterprise, a global leader in car and truck rentals, operates in over 100 territories and countries, with 75 locations across British Columbia.

Enterprise is focused on offering valuable opportunities for business students, including internships specifically designed for third-year students. These internships last for four months, and upon completion, when interns return to school, they are often offered full-time positions for when they graduate. Students who make use of this opportunity, begin their career, in terms of seniority and training, at month five, rather than month one. This structure ensures students are properly recognized for their contributions during their internship.

Furthermore, as an international company, Enterprise offers great flexibility, allowing interns the opportunity to work in different locations around the world, making it an exciting prospect for students interested in gaining global experience or on the other hand, working close to home. This is just one example of how we are working to provide valuable, real-world learning experiences that will benefit our students' personal and professional growth.

In addition, Enterprise is a proud benefactor of the School of Business, providing the school with a yearly donation. In the coming year, this donation will support the creation of a Women in Business student club as well as a social media student ambassador program, appropriately titled, the Enterprise Student Social Media Ambassador Program. Alongside their financial support, Enterprise will be an active participant in the development of these programs. This is a perfect example of what can come from the integration of systems of higher with the business world. We greatly appreciate their support and look forward to all the great work our two organizations can achieve together.

Teck Resources

Another example can be seen with **Teck Resources**, a Canadian natural resources company that focuses on the exploration, development, and production of various resources, particularly in the mining sector, and well known for its commitment to sustainable development. CECE and the School of Business welcomed Teck to campus on November 5, 2024. The event included three speakers.

Sargun Gill is a third-year Business student and currently serve as President of the Enactus UFV organization. She is completing her second internship as a Talent Management Assistant Co-op with Teck, following an earlier experience with PCL Construction, where she worked as a Human Resources and Professional Development student for the BC Region. Through these internships, she gained hands-on experience across various HR areas, including Succession Planning, Performance Management, Recruitment, and Learning & Development.

Masaki Miyoshi joined Teck in 2019 in the newly created role of Lead of Campus Talent Acquisition where he oversees the organization's global campus strategy. 
