### NATASHA AND LEANNE'S ADVICE TO FACULTY

#### Remain open to blind spots on your decolonization journey

Wherever you are in the process, there is always more to learn. If a student or colleague alerts you to a blind spot, listen with [humility](#) and act with courage. Remember that discipline specific decolonizing resources now exist for almost all fields. #### Incorporate Indigenous pedagogies
